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

Short history OF ELTE 1635 Cardinal Péter Pázmány signed the founding documents of the University in Nagyszombat (today: Trnava, Slovakia). The first two faculties at the university were the Faculty of Humanities and the Faculty of Theology. The Faculty of Law was founded 1769 The Medical Faculty was founded. The University moved to Buda. 1860 Authorisation of Hungarian as a language of education at the University. 1869 The "State Teacher Training Institution" (predecessor of the Faculty of Primary and Pre-School Education) was founded. Europe's first Teacher Training School, (predecessor of ELTE Trefort Ágoston 1898 Teacher Training School) was founded. The Budapest University Athletics Club (BEAC) was 1900 founded. Launch of the first Special Needs Education Teacher Training Course in 1948 the world. (Predecessor of Bárczi Gusztáv Faculty of Special Needs Education). ELTE Bartók Béla Choir was founded. 1950 The University adopted the name of the world-renowned physicist Loránd Eötvös. 2000 The Faculty of Theology became an independent higher education institution. The Faculty of Primary and Pre-School Education and the Bárczi Gusztáv Faculty of Special Needs Education were integrated into The Faculty of Informatics, the Faculty of the University. Education and Psychology, and the Faculty of Social Sciences were founded 2006 Member of the European University Association (EUA) ELTE was awarded 2010 the Erasmus E-Quality Label. ELTE was awarded the title "research university." Quality Award for International Cooperation. University of Excellence Award Savaria University Centre was integrated into ELTE. The Institute of Business Economics and the Berzsenyi Dániel Teacher Training Centre were founded. Faculty of Business Economics formed from the Institute of Business Economics.

Academic system AT ELTE

ELTE is an internationally recognised higher education institution, and its programmes are accredited by the Hungarian Accreditation Board. Degrees issued by Eötvös Loránd University are acknowledged worldwide, and its course credits are transferable in all countries in the European Union.

Eötvös Loránd University, and Hungarian higher education in general, have joined the Bologna Process. Accordingly, the consecutive training cycles of higher education leading to a tertiary degree are alapképzés (Bachelor's programme), mesterképzés (Master's programme) and doktori képzés (Doctoral programme). Bachelor's and Master's courses are taught in consecutive cycles, in the form of separate BA and MA programmes, or in cases specified by law in the form of unified, one-tier programmes.

Structure of Studies

Students studying in Bachelor's and Master's programmes complete their studies by passing a final examination. The final examination may consist of the defence of the Bachelor's or Master's thesis, and additional oral, written or practical examinations.

First/Second Degree (Two-Tier) Programmes

The first higher education degree is the alapfokozat (Bachelor's degree) along with a professional qualification. A Bachelor's programme involves obtaining 180-240 credits. The length of the programme is 6-8 semesters.

The second higher education degree is mesterfokozat (Master's degree) along with a professional qualification. The Master's programme is built on a Bachelor's programme: you need to have a Bachelor's degree to start a Master's programme, which involves obtaining 60-120 credits. The length of the programme is 2-4 semesters.

Integrated "Long" (One-tier) Programmes

A unified one-tier programme leading to the mesterfokozat (Master's degree) lasts 10-12 semesters and requires the completion of 300-360 credits. Mainly religious education, arts, medicine and health sciences programmes belong to this category and specific Master's courses such as law and teacher training.

Doctoral Programme

Built on a Master's programme and a Master's degree, the doktori képzés (Doctoral programme) involves at least 240 credits. Since September 2016, the programme is 8 semesters (4 years) long. Following a Doctoral programme, in a separate degree procedure, the academic degree "Doctor of Philosophy" (abbreviation: PhD), in arts education "Doctor of Liberal Arts" (abbreviation: DLA), or in business training "Doctor of Business Administration" (abbreviation: DBA) may be awarded. In the case of an exceptionally talented applicant, doctoral training is accessible even with a degree obtained in a bachelor program and a professional aualification.

ECTS Credit System AND GRADING

The Hungarian academic credit system, in line with the relevant Hungarian law, is ECTS-compatible. The calculation of credits is based on the number of academic hours completed by students (one credit equals 30 academic hours on average).

At the end of the semester, the assessment of knowledge is generally carried out according to a five-grade scale: excellent (5), good (4), satisfactory (3), pass (2), and fail (1); a three-grade scale: excellent (5), average (3), unsatisfactory (1) or a two-grade scale: completed (5), not completed (1).

The ECTS conversion table ensures transfer procedures between the Hungarian academic credit system and the ECTS. The recognition of courses completed abroad is based on the credit transfer regulations. For incoming international students, a Transcript of Records is issued at the end of the semester, which contains the code and title of the completed courses, credits, grades, and the ECTS-compatible grades.

International STUDENTS AT ELTE

About 5,300 international students from more than 120 different countries study at ELTE.

Full degree bachelor's, master's and doctoral students undertake their entire course of studies here. In addition to self-funded students, Hungarian governmental scholarship holders (studying under the Stipendium Hungaricum Programme, the Scholarship Programme for Christian Young People and the Hungarian Diaspora Scholarship Programme) also obtain their degrees at ELTE.

Erasmus+ students come from a European university with whom ELTE has an Inter-Institutional Agreement for a study period of one or two semesters.

Erasmus+ international credit mobility students come from non-EU universities with whom ELTE has a bilateral exchange agreement for a study period of one or two semesters.

Further incoming mobility students study at ELTE for one or two semesters within the framework of institutional bilateral agreements, via ELTE's membership of university networks, or further (mainly governmental) scholarship programmes (e.g. CEEPUS, Hungarian State Scholarships, Visegrad Fund)

About Hungarian Governmental SCHOLARSHIPS

STIPENDIUM HUNGARICUM PROGRAMME

(partial studies are also available)

Stipendium Hungaricum, funded in 2013, is the most prestigious Hungarian higher educational scholarship programme, offering a wide range of courses for international students with excellent academic track records. The scholarship aims to support the internationalisation of Hungarian higher education and its constant development, and to strengthen the international relations of the academic and research community, as well as to promote the good reputation and competitiveness of Hungarian higher education throughout the world.

It is based on bilateral education agreements between Hungary and the governments of the sending countries and is already available on five continents in almost 100 countries and territories, attracting thousands of international students each year worldwide. ELTE is expecting to welcome more than 800 of these students who start in the 2025/2026 academic year. This means that we expect about 2,000 Stipendium Hungaricum students to be studying here, which is 5% of the whole community and close to 40% of international students.

The Students at Risk Sub-programme is an addition to the Stipendium Hungaricum Scholarship Programme; its goal is to provide assistance to Ukrainian students and doctoral candidates fleeing the war in their country. The sub-programme provides scholarships for studies in Hungarian higher education institutions.

Stipendium Hungaricum Sports Scholarship is another sub-programme, whose purpose is to provide support for the studies of foreign students with internationally recognized sporting achievements in Hungarian higher education institutions, and for their participation in competitive university sports and non-university competitive sports, as well as to assist the development of sporting life in Hungarian higher education.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME FOR CHRISTIAN YOUNG PEOPLE

The Scholarship Programme for Christian Young People (SCYP) was founded in 2017. The core mission of the SCYP is to provide opportunities to pursue higher education studies in Hungarian host institutions for young Christians who live in crisis regions of the world or who are being persecuted in their home countries because of their faith.

After completing their studies, scholarship holders can become catalysts for development in their own countries and contribute to building capacities and strengthening resilience at the local level with the knowledge they have acquired in Hungary.

The programme welcomes students country-wide from nine different countries: Syria, Pakistan, Iraq, Israel and Palestine, Lebanon, Nigeria, Kenya, Egypt, Ethiopia, Armenia and Nicaragua - students studying at ELTE come from 5 different countries.

HUNGARIAN DIASPORA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME

The Hungarian Diaspora Scholarship was established for those who belong to the Hungarian diaspora outside Europe and wish to study at a Hungarian higher education institution to develop their personal, professional, and cultural ties with Hungary.

The programme aims to support the professional advancement of the scholarship holders with high-quality Hungarian higher education in addition to improving their Hungarian language skills and strengthening their Hungarian identity. After graduation, scholarship holders will return to their home country with competitive skills and knowledge that will enable them to support their community, preserve Hungarian values, and reinforce the links between the diaspora and Hungary.

ELTE welcomed the first Diaspora Scholarship holder student in 2021/2022. By accepting about 40 new students in the upcoming academic year, the whole number of participants will reach nearly 100.

Contact your faculty international coordinator (p. 90, Appendix B)

While you are here at ELTE, your faculty international coordinator will give you information about administrative issues related to your studies.



Registration/Enrolment

Enrol if you come to study on a degree programme with the intent to earn a degree from ELTE. **Register** if you come to study at ELTE as a non-degree-seeking, exchange student.

Enrolment: If you are a new full-degree student, your student status will be established by enrolment, which is therefore a compulsory procedure consisting of two parts, an electronic and a personal administration section. If the personal data given during the enrolment procedure are correct and you have received your "Neptun code" in advance, you can start the electronic part even before leaving your home country (p. 20), if not, you can do it after arriving at ELTE. Check the list of documents you must bring with you for the procedure (originals are needed!). If you have any questions, please contact the FACULTY coordinator.

Registration: If you are an exchange student at ELTE, please ask your faculty international coordinator to help you with the registration process. It is important that you register so that your faculty coordinator can arrange your official student status in the "Neptun" online registry system at ELTE before your arrival.



Ask for a mentor (p. 44)

An English-speaking local student mentor (a member of the student organisation ESN ELTE or the Stipendium Hungaricum Mentor Network) will help you find your way at ELTE and in Budapest. Your local student mentor is available for you throughout the whole period of your stay at ELTE. Arrange your visa application (p. 30)

Citizens of the states of the European Economic Area (EEA) are entitled to enter the territory of the Hungarian Republic in possession of a valid identity card or passport and may stay, for up to 90 days, without any special authorisation.

If your stay is going to exceed 90 days, you have to apply for a **Registration Certificate** during the first 90 days on the Enter Hungary website of the National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing: **enterhungary.gov.hu**

If you are a student from a non-EEA country, you need to obtain a residence permit for the purpose of study. If you need a visa to enter Hungary, you have to submit the residence permit application form at the Hungarian Consulate or at other locations authorised to issue residence or nationality permits. You are strongly advised to apply for the residence permit for the purpose of study in your home country as soon as you receive the Letter of Acceptance, but at least one month before arriving in Hungary. With this procedure, you are also applying for the residence permit visa (D-visa) which allows you to enter Hungary only once and stay for 30 days before receiving your residence permit. If you come from a visa-waiver country, you may arrive in Hungary and stay here legally for 90 days. After your arrival, you have to apply online for a residence permit for the purpose of study on the Enter Hungary website of the National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing: enterhungary.gov.hu



Arrange travel and health insurance to cover your journey and the period until you receive insurance from ELTE (p. 36)

All international students can arrange private health insurance at ELTE for the duration of their studies.

Note that if you hold a Hungarian governmental scholarship, you are eligible for health insurance that will be arranged by the university after you are enrolled, if you have requested it and have all the necessary documents.



Arrange your journey to HUNGARY

Please arrange your journey to Budapest, Hungary so that you arrive before the academic year starts (or preferably, before the Orienttion Week).

First day of tuition: 8 September 2025



Arrange accommodation in BUDAPEST (p. 54)

International students at ELTE can apply for places in the ELTE dormitories, or they can ask the Housing Office for help in finding an apartment in Budapest.



Read the academic regulations at ELTE and the GUIDE of your respective scholarship programme

As a student enrolled at ELTE, you need to know all your rights and obligations. Please read the academic regulations at ELTE carefully and make yourself familiar with your rights and **obligations.** Also, please read all additional information that is relevant to your scholarship. **elte.hu/en/regulations**



Sign up for a Hungarian Language Course already in the summer (optional, p. 43)

ELTE offers Hungarian language courses for international students both in the summer and during the semester. If you would like to learn some basic Hungarian in advance, sign up for the Summer University.



Sign up to the Orientation Week and the Welcome Ceremony (p. 38)

We strongly advise you to attend the Orientation Week organized for international students at ELTE. Sign up for the programmes here: elte.hu/en/orientation



Finalise your tasks at apply.elte.hu (only for full-degree students)

Check all your tasks at **apply.elte.hu** and get ready to travel to Hungary and start your studies at ELTE.

Meet your mentor (p. 44)

When you arrive at the airport or your accommodation, contact your local student mentor who can show you around the campus and the city.



If you are an exchange student, check in at your FACULTY coordinator, who will:

- help you register at ELTE and for the semester as well;
- set your status as "active" in the Neptun electronic registry system;
- give you your Neptun code;
- give you a certificate to prove that you have student status at ELTE.



If you are a student, get your Neptun code and password (p. 28)

You need to have both your Neptun code, and your Neptun password in order to be able to use the Neptun registry system. Your FACULTY coordinator will send your Neptun code in advance, or give it to you upon arrival and then you can create your own Neptun password by following the instructions here: neptun.elte.hu/Account/NewPassword

If you don't succeed, you can request your Neptun password in person at Quaestura Office during opening hours: neptun.elte.hu/Qter



If you are a full-degree student, check the enrolment information of the FACULTY

If you are a full-degree student, check the enrolment information of the FACULTY Enrolment: the procedure is compulsory and consists of two parts, an electronic and a personal administration

section. Log in to Neptun to register for the next semester and print the "enrolment package" (consisting of different forms and declarations). If you have any problems with this, please contact your FACULTY coordinator. The personal part can only take place after the electronic part, as the documents produced during the electronic part have to be signed and handed in. Do not forget to bring the necessary documents with you for the personal part. If you have a scholarship, as part of the enrolment you also have to sign the scholarship agreement; if you are a self-financed student, you have to sign an educational agreement.



Course registration

Log into Neptun with your Neptun code and password and you can sign up for the courses of the AUTUMN semester 2025/2026. Check the deadlines for Neptun administrative procedures here: neptun.elte.hu/oktig/tanugyi-idorend. ELTE offers Hungarian language courses for international students during the semester. When you sign up for your mandatory courses, you can also sign up for these as optional ones.



Request a residence permit (p. 30)

If you traveled to Hungary visa-free, you need to apply for a residence permit for the purpose of study online, on the Enter Hungary website.

If you traveled to Hungary with a D-visa and already applied for the residence permit at the Hungarian embassy/consulate in your home country, you only need to receive your residence permit.

All residence permits for the purpose of study are sent to the address of the university by post. You can receive your residence permit at the ELTE Quaestura Office, shortly after it arrives. Please wait for a Neptun notification from Quaestura with the time and place to receive your card.



Request a Student Identity Card (p. 29)

After your arrival and enrolment, you can obtain a Student Identity Card or a Temporary Student Certificate depending on the length of your studies at ELTE.



Attend the Orientation Week (p. 38)

There is an Orientation Week organised for all newly arriving international students at the beginning of each semester. We strongly advise you to attend the events, where you can meet fellow international students and hear about the university and practical matters.



Administrative TO-DO LIST

Only for recipients of a scholarship funded by the Hungarian Government:

Request your health insurance: TAJ card (p. 36)

Health care services are available for students holding a Hungarian governmental scholarship. They are entitled to receive a social security card, called a "TAJ" card. Information on requesting a TAJ card can be found here: neptun.elte.hu/qter/gyik/TAJ-kartya



Open a Hungarian bank account (p. 84)

In order to receive the scholarship, you need to open a Hungarian bank account and register it in the Neptun system.



Request a Tax Identification Number and Card (p. 84)

The National Tax and Customs Administration of Hungary issues the Tax Identification Number and Card. Please contact any of their offices. If you do not register your Tax ID number in the Neptun system (ask the Quaestura Office for help in registering), scholarships cannot be transferred to you.

After your arrival in Hungary, you need to complete some administrative procedures in order to begin your studies at ELTE. The Quaestura Office will give you a helping hand during the administrative procedure.

- Providing the Neptun code/user name and password for students and professors
- Health insurance management (for scholarship holders and self-financed students)
- Social Security Card (TAJ card) management
- Giving out residence permits issued by the immigration office

- Providing Certificate of Student Status
- Recording and correcting personal data in the Neptun system

Neptun, the electronic registry system AT ELTE

Neptun is the electronic registry system at ELTE, which makes the administration of your studies easier and faster. You can register for the semesters, apply for your courses and exams, follow the results of your courses and financial matters, receive official notifications, and communicate with your fellow students and professors via Neptun.

When you visit neptun.elte.hu, click on 'Log in' on the top right corner of the page. Then type your Neptun ID (6 characters) as the 'Identifier' and your password. Two-step authentication is required to log in to Neptun, which requires a second step after entering the Neptun ID and password. After logging in click on 'Student web' on the top of the page.

For more information on how to obtain a Neptun ID, please contact your faculty coordinator. After you have the Neptun ID, you can create a password using this website: **neptun.elte.hu/Account/NewPassword**. After you arrive at ELTE, you can also request your Neptun password in person at the Quaestura Office.

Your Student Identity Card or Student ID will certify that you are a student of ELTE and will make you eligible for student discounts in several places (e.g. a monthly pass for public transportation, museum tickets, etc.). It is strongly recommended that you request a Student Identity Card for yourself once you arrive in Hungary. Remember, first you have to enrol at the faculty; only then are you eligible for a Student ID from the first day of the study period (8 September 2025).

For students studying at ELTE for less than 12 months: Temporary Student Certificate

To get your temporary Student ID document, valid from the first day of the study period (8 September 2025), please visit the Quaestura Office with your passport. The Temporary Student Certificate is valid for 60 days and you need to renew it after 60 days at the Quaestura Office. You can also initiate a request to obtain a permanent student card – this is optional.

For students studying at ELTE for more than 12 months: Plastic Student Card

If you are a student staying at ELTE for more than 12 months (e.g. a full-time student), you need to request a permanent student card. This is a plastic orange-brown card, similar in size to a bank card.

Obtaining a Student Card (the main steps)

- First, you need to visit one of the offices of the Hungarian Integrated Government Customer Service (in Hungarian "Kormányablak"). Since staff members are not required to speak English in these offices, you need to ask your mentor to help with this step.
- The official of the Integrated Government Customer Service will ask you **to register in the system** there and **will take your photo** for your Student Identity Card.
- After registration you will receive a "NEK" document.

(In the first half of the registration period in September you may be able to arrange your NEK document at the on-site services of the "Kormányablak" at the university after registration. For details, please contact your faculty's International Office.)

- Next, you have to create a request in Neptun using the NEK-document. Please read carefully
 through the detailed step-by-step guide on the website of the Quaestura Office before starting
 the application neptun.elte.hu/qter/gyik/Diakigazolvany.
- Once you have finished creating a student card request, the Quaestura Office will issue your Temporary Student Certificate at your request until the permanent student card is issued.
- It takes a few months for your permanent student card to be manufactured; therefore, we strongly
 advise you to request a temporary student certificate as well. The student card will be posted to
 the Quaestura Office, who will notify you in a Neptun message as soon as it arrives and is ready for
 collection.

Legalising your stay IN HUNGARY

After you have successfully passed the entrance exam, you will receive an official notification from ELTE that you have been admitted to the study programme (a Letter of Admission/Acceptance document is issued and sent to you). Before you start your studies at ELTE, you need to ensure your legal status in Hungary. Considering what part of the world you are coming to Hungary from, choose the appropriate way to make your stay legal.

If you are a **citizen of an EU/EEA member state** (EEA = EU member states and Norway, Switzerland, Iceland, and Lichtenstein), you may travel to Hungary without a long-term study visa, but you need to obtain a **registration card** for the duration of your studies in Hungary.

If you are a **citizen of a country that is not part of the European Economic Area (non-EEA)**, you are required to obtain a **residence permit** (and in the case of most countries, a visa).

If you are a non-EEA citizen and come from a country **that is under visa obligations** according to the Schengen acquis, you need to apply for a D-visa and a residence permit for the purpose of study at a Hungarian consulate/embassy before traveling. We advise you to make an appointment as soon as you receive the Letter of Acceptance, because the application process may take several weeks!

If you come from a visa-waiver country, after you arrive in Budapest, you can arrange your registration card (EEA) or residence permit (non-EEA) online, on the Enter Hungary website of the National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing (in Hungarian: "Országos Idegenrendészeti Főigazgatóság", abbreviated as OIF) enterhungary.gov.hu_

On the website, you can apply for your registration card, extend your residence permit, register your accommodation, etc.

If you are an EEA national

REGISTRATION CARD FOR EEA NATIONALS

Citizens of the states of the European Economic Area (EEA) are entitled to enter the territory of Hungary in possession of a valid identity card or passport and may stay for up to 90 days, without any special authorisation. EEA citizens planning to stay for more than 90 days in Hungary have to apply for a registration certificate to be issued.

BEFORE YOU ARRIVE IN HUNGARY



You need to have a valid identity card or passport to enter Hungary. You do not need to arrange anything else in advance.

AFTER YOU ARRIVE IN HUNGARY



If you are an EEA student studying at ELTE for more than 90 days, you need to apply for a registration certificate.

How to apply for a registration certificate?

You need to submit your request with the required documents on the Enter Hungary website.

You should receive the registration certificate in an official letter by post to the address in Hungary that you declared on the registration form within two weeks. After you register your accommodation, you will receive a QR code, which will function as your address card. This is an official document that is only valid together with your residence permit.

BEFORE YOU LEAVE HUNGARY



Before you finish your studies at ELTE in Hungary and move back to your own country, it is advisable to go to the National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing and cancel your registration certificate and your address card.

If you are a non-EEA national

RESIDENCE PERMIT FOR NON-EEA NATIONALS

BEFORE YOU ARRIVE IN HUNGARY



You need to obtain a residence permit for the purpose of study if you are a student from the non-European Economic Area (non-EEA) and you wish

- to study in a registered secondary or Hungarian higher educational institution
- to participate in a preparatory course for higher education organised by a higher educational institution, which ensures that you have sufficient command of the language for your studies.

If you are coming from a **visa waiver country** (check it here: **konzinfo.mfa.gov.hu/en/visa-free-travel-hungary**), you can apply for the Residence Permit for the Purpose of Studies at the Hungarian Consulate of your home country before or after you arrive in Hungary.

If you come from a **country that is under visa obligations** according to the Schengen acquis, you need to **apply for the Residence Permit for the Purpose of Studies** and besides this, also a **residence permit visa (D-visa)** through a residence permit application before you come to Hungary. The residence permit visa (D-visa) is valid for 3 months, and allows you to enter Hungary (directly, not through any Schengen country), and stay here for 30 days in order to collect your residence permit card. After you arrive in Hungary, you will receive your residence permit card at the university.

RESIDENCE PERMIT APPLICATION IN YOUR COUNTRY

You need to submit the residence permit application to the Hungarian Consulate (check it here: konzinfo.mfa.gov.hu/en/embassies#hungarian-embassies-abroad) or at other locations authorised to receive residence permit applications which operates in the country of your permanent residence or nationality.

AFTER YOU ARRIVE IN HUNGARY



If you have already applied for a residence permit at the Hungarian consulate/embassy in your home country, you need to receive your residence permit.

If you come from a visa-waiver country and have not yet applied for a residence permit, you need to apply for a residence permit for the purpose of study online on the Enter Hungary website: **enterhungary.gov.hu**

Please note that after you submit your application, you have to visit the office of the National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing in person within 15 days.

All residence permits for the purpose of study are sent to the address of the university by post. You can receive your residence permit at the ELTE Quaestura Office, shortly after it arrives. Please wait for a notification from the Quaestura with the time and place to receive your card.


If you are a self funded student

Scholarship, bank account statement, or a bank account statement of your parents' and a declaration from your parents that they support you financially, etc.

Any health insurance valid in the territory of the EU

Internationally recognised language exam OR proof of former studies in the working language of the study programme.

The fee of the procedure is payable via electronic payment instrument (bank card). Holders of state scholarships are exempted from the application fee!



VALIDITY OF THE RESIDENCE PERMIT

Please note that the residence permit is only valid together with your Address card and your passport.

- If the course is shorter than three years, the duration of the permit reflects this.
- If the course takes three years or more, the permit is issued for at least one and a maximum of three years, which can be extended if appropriate by one or at most three years.
- Students with passive status are not entitled to have a residence permit for the purpose of study! Please note that if you "passivate" your semester, your residence permit will be invalidated by the authorities and you will have to leave the country until you have active student status again (unless you have another kind of residence permit, e.g. for the purpose of employment).

EXTENDING YOUR RESIDENCE PERMIT

Before your residence permit expires, you need to apply for the extension of the permit.

How to apply?

You need to submit your request online on the **Enter Hungary website**. (The earliest time one can apply for an extension is 90 days before the expiry of their residence permit card. Applications should ideally be submitted 45 days before the expiry of the permit but may be submitted up until the expiry of the residence permit card in case of necessity.) Please note that in order to have the permit extended, you need to spend more than 90 days in Hungary in the 180 days prior to the application!

After submitting the online application, the applicant needs to book an appointment on the **website** of the National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing and visit the customer service (1135 Budapest, Szegedi út 37.) in person within 15 days from the submission to provide biometric data (e.g. photo and fingerprint). Booking the appointment and showing up in person is the responsibility of the applicant. (In case no appointments are available online, the applicant can show up in person without an appointment, and wait in the line.)

When you apply for the extension of a residence permit, you need to present a **valid passport** (it must cover the whole period of authorised stay); **the previous residence card** and previous address card issued by the authorities; and the **same documents as in the case of the first application (see the list above).** A new certificate of active student status certified by the university – you can submit your request online through "Q-tér". You have to submit a document named Transcript of Records (if you are not a first-year student) – you can receive this document from your faculty's registrar's office.

If your address has not changed, it is enough for you to present the former address card and make a declaration that your accommodation has not changed. **Please note** that the contract of lease must cover the whole period of your stay in Hungary. (When you sign the lease agreement, please bear in mind that your contract should contain the possibility for an extension.)

WORKING IN HUNGARY DURING YOUR STUDIES WITH A RESIDENCE PERMIT

You can be employed during your studies with a residence permit for the purpose of studies for 30 hours a week during the study period, or 90 days days outside the study period on a full-time basis.



(2) REPORTING OBLIGATIONS OF THIRD COUNTRY NATIONALS (NON-EEA) LIVING IN HUNGARY

If you are a non-EEA student, you are required to **register your accommodation during the residence permit application process.** If your address changes any time during your stay in Hungary, you need to report it on the Enter Hungary website within **three days of taking up residence.**

NOTE! The evidence of registration of accommodation issued by the authorities must be **kept and carried on** their person by the third country national and presented to the authorities if requested.

HOW TO APPLY?

You are required to submit the notification of accommodation online, on the Enter Hungary website. This procedure is free of charge.

Please download this from elte.hu/en/visa-procedure/non-eea and ask your dormitory/landlord/agent to sign it before submitting it online.
Dormitory certificate (stamped and signed by the dormitory management); or Proof of student hostel accommodation (stamped and signed by the hostel management); or Contract of Lease, which should contain your and your landlord's personal data (ID Card/Passport number, mother's maiden name), the exact address (postal code, city, street/square/road, house number, floor number, door number), period of stay (definite/indefinite time), signed by you and your landlord, and by two witnesses.
If you have already registered your accommodation, please take the "Address card" with you as evidence of the registration of the accommodation issued by the authorities.

BEFORE YOU LEAVE HUNGARY



You are not allowed to stay in Hungary after your residence permit has expired. When your residence permit expires, you need to leave Hungary.



Healthcare and

HEALTH INSURANCE

Have you heard the saying that "health is your greatest wealth"? We believe it is true, and we want you to have the best experience during your stay in Hungary, without any interruptions due to health issues. Of course, we are fully aware that you are young and have an unbeatable immune system, but in case of pandemics, slippery icy roads, and summer evenings packed with way too much fun it is better to have something to fall back on (not quite literally).

Here at ELTE, we give you all the assistance you need to find the best health insurance you can obtain with your student status. However, you still have to complete the administrative procedures. We ask you to keep up to date with the relevant information in relation to your insurance. But that should not be a problem for you; after all, you are a capable international student at Hungary's best university.

This page is dedicated to students' health insurance - please pay close attention to it.

For detailed information on the type of health insurance that suits you, and for all the updates, please check this website: elte.hu/en/health-insurance

Please note that your health and your health insurance are your responsibility. Pay attention to the administrative procedures and visit the website (elte.hu/en/health-insurance) frequently for all the relevant information. Should you need medical care without having health insurance you will be liable for all costs of treatment, which are generally high in Hungary.

If you are an EEA (EU member states, Norway, Lichtenstein, Icelandand Switzerland, United Kingdom) student, please apply for a European Health Insurance Card from your health insurance provider in your home country before you leave home.

If you are a non-EEA student, please be aware that you have to take care of your own health insurance before leaving your country. After your arrival you have to arrange your health insurance at ELTE for the semesters you spend at the university. Besides the European Health Insurance Card, you are still able to buy the private health insurance package offered by ELTE.

If you are a student with a scholarship offered by the Minister of Education in Hungary, you are entitled to a social security card (in Hungarian "TAJ card") with your social security number ("TAJ number") on it that enables you to use public healthcare services.



European Health Insurance Card - EHIC

Citizens of the EEA and Switzerland can access all healthcare services if they have a European Health Insurance Card. This can be obtained free of charge in your home country.

The card does not cover health issues that can wait until you return to your own country (e.g. some types of dental care); it only covers healthcare that is normally covered by a statutory healthcare system in Hungary. The main purpose of the card is to make sure that you do not have to interrupt your stay here, because you can get the same medical care that Hungarians would. The expiry date may vary from country to country, so it is advisable to enquire about it when you obtain the card at your local health authority.

NOTE! The health insurance card is valid only together with your passport. Please always carry your health insurance card and passport with you.

Health insurance for holders of Hungarian Governmental Scholarships (e.g., Stipendium Hungaricum, Scholarship Programme for Christian Young People, Hungarian Diaspora Scholarship)

In partnership with Semmelweis University, scholarship holders are also provided with English-speaking general practitioner care.

As stated in the Operational Regulations, each scholarship holder is entitled to 65.000 HUF healthcare contribution each semester. These funds are allocated and managed centrally by the university to cover scholarship-related medical expenses. At the beginning of your studies you will be entitled for private insurance that provides you with emergency healthcare services in English This insurance is only for the period until you receive your social security card, as the amount of support provided does not allow for the provision of continuous private health insurance.

With the "TAJ card" (the card for Hungary's national health insurance scheme), scholarship holders are insured by the state and they can access public healthcare, not just emergency or urgent care, so it is highly recommended for international scholarship holders to apply for a social security card at the beginning of their studies.

The social security card ("TAJ card") can be requested online on the official website of the Quaestura Office at ELTE: neptun.elte.hu/Case/Group/TAJGeneral

You should take care of the whole process of obtaining your social security card from the first step (registration) to the last (receiving the actual plastic card). This also means that you have to follow the administrative procedures and read the emails and Neptun system messages sent by ELTE administrators.

ELTE has partnered with Semmelweis University to provide English-language general practitioner (GP) care for students holding Stipendium Hungaricum, Hungarian Diaspora, or SCYP scholarships who have a valid TAJ number and therefore general public health insurance.

Private health insurance for self-financed students

You can purchase this fee-for-service health insurance in person at the **Quaestura Office of Student Services.** Fee-for-service health insurance covers the costs of medical and healthcare services, within the framework of an insurance policy. After completing and signing the insured's statement, you will be provided all the neccessary details via email.

WIFI at ELTE

All ELTE campuses offer free WIFI access to ELTE students. To access the Campus WIFI, you need to to arrange an IIG ID here: **ugykezelo.elte.hu/**

- Click on "Belépés" ("belépés" means "login").
- 2. Select authentication via Neptun by clicking on the Neptun icon in the top right corner, then type your Neptun ID and your password, then log in ("Bejelentkezés").
- 3. Use the flag icon to switch into English
- 4. Choose your own IIG username ("Chosen IIG ID" = "Választott IIG Azonosító"). Choose wisely, because your IIG username will form the first part of your e-mail address at ELTE.
- Choose your password and type it in at the section "Chosen IIG password" ("Választott IIG Jelszó") and the same password at "Választott IIG Jelszó Megerősítés" ("Validating your chosen IIG password").
- 6. If you want to use ELTE Wi-Fi, you must also tick the box "I would also like to create a WiFi ID" ("Kérem a WIFI azonosító létrehozását is")
- 7. By clicking on "Request" ("Igénylés"), you create your IIG ID and your ELTE email address (which can be used for correspondence, Teams and other O365 services).

Your Personalised ELTE E-mail Address

Every student at the university is entitled to use a personalised ELTE e-mail address and is requested to do so.

After getting the IIG username (see above), you will be automatically assigned an e-mail address called: **yourusername@student.elte.hu** with 100 GB storage.

You can access your messages with the help of the usual programmes (Microsoft Outlook, Thunderbird, etc.). Please enter your personalised e-mail address to the Neptun ("My data" menu "Contact information" / "Email address" tab) as the default one. During your studies, you can deal with official issues faster and more easily if you use your ELTE email address and you will be required to use it for logging in to the Teams platform, too.

Libraries

University Library and Archives

The University Library (konyvtar.elte.hu/en) was **founded in 1561** by the Jesuit order; it is **one of the oldest libraries in the country**, and was opened to the public in 1876. Until 1949, it collected works from all disciplines taught at the university, later it was limited to philosophy and medieval and early modern history, as well as religion and the history of religion. Since then, the library has had nation-wide responsibility for the collection of publications in these fields. The historical collection, as part of the National Cultural Heritage of Hungary, includes 185 codices, 1,200 incunabula, 11,000 works from the 16th, 15,000 from the 17th, and 75,000 from the 18th century.

Registration is free for all employees and students of ELTE, and your Student Identity Card can be used as a library card. Our **ELTE Library WebApp** is a web application optimised for smart phones. The app replaces the paper-based library card and also offers a number of additional features.

In addition to the traditional library services, **the Library provides access to e-books, e-journals, and databases** and, if licences allow, they are made available for the students of ELTE also from home.

Courses in database management, literature searching, publishing, and library use are organised regularly with the aim of fostering the independent use of library services and information resources, as well as basic research activities. The Library supports open access publishing by aiding submission of articles to open access journals and enhancing self-archiving. The portal of the University Library Service (ULS) (eltekonyvtarak.elte.hu/en), based on the cooperation of the network of libraries, offers full-scale information on all the libraries of the eight ELTE faculties. The OPAC (opac.elte.hu) contains records of almost 1.5 million copies of documents, such as books, journals, special and electronic documents, and dissertations found at the University Library and other libraries belonging to the ELTE network.

Library Days at ELTE

The Library Days event is held in Trefort Garden at the Faculty of Humanities at the beginning of each academic year. Library Days are organised every autumn, and most of the libraries in Budapest take part and introduce their services. This event will help you find the most appropriate library for your studies, and you will have the opportunity to register for the services on the spot.

Other libraries in Budapest:

It is worth taking the opportunity to visit some notable libraries elsewhere in the capital:



National Széchényi Library – oszk.hu

Located in the rear wing of the Royal Palace, in Buda. It is a national library with the largest collection in the country, including some surviving books from the library of King Matthias, the renowned Renaissance Monarch. (They are known as "Corvina", since the heraldic animal of the king was the raven, called 'corvus' in Latin.)



Library of Parliament - ogyk.hu

The House of the Hungarian Parliament established its own library at the end of the 1860s. In 1902 the library moved to the newly built Parliament on the banks of Danube. It only became a public collection in 1952; until that time, access was permitted only to institutions and professionals.



Library and Information Centre of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences –

konyvtar.mta.hu/index_en.php

This is a special national research library. Since its foundation in 1826, it has dedicated itself to supporting scientific and scholarly research and safeguarding its precious collections.



Metropolitan Ervin Szabó Library – fszek.hu

Located in a magnificent neo-Baroque palace completed in 1889, as well as in a new wing, it now boasts one of the most interesting library interiors of Europe. The café is to be found in the former stables.



National Library of Foreign Literature - oik.hu

Originally built for the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA), a Russian language-library was opened in 1956 under the name of "Gorky Library", which later started to collect other foreign language items, as well. Many people in Budapest still call it "Gorky" today. It has a very pleasant atmosphere with a rich selection of journals.





Learn HUNGARIAN

ELTE offers Hungarian language courses to its international students during their studies at ELTE. Courses are available at different levels. The type and level of courses depend on the demand of applicants for the given semester. btk.elte.hu/hungarian-language-courses

General Hungarian Language Courses

Eötvös Loránd University offers courses on Hungarian language and culture at all levels from complete beginner (A1) to proficiency level (C1). They offer diverse course types: language and culture, general language courses.

The 10-11-week courses start at the beginning of both spring and autumn semesters. The curriculum has been developed for one or two 90-minute classes per week for a period of one semester. Students receive 3 or 6 ECTS credits after successfully completing the course.

Mentoring SYSTEM

Eötvös Loránd University offers a targeted **student mentoring programme to all incoming students** who would like to receive personal mentoring before their arrival and/or during their stay in Budapest.

Mentors help international students with everyday problems, and they guide students through their international experience during their stay at ELTE in Budapest. They are enthusiastic, open-minded, and helpful ELTE students. International students can turn to their mentors for help any time they need it. Mentors will be there to support international students during their first steps in Hungary and at the university in issues, such as university administration, finding a flat or room, the best pubs, shops, restaurants, etc. There are mentors working at each ELTE faculty, so international students can turn to their mentors with faculty-specific questions as well.

There are two main mentoring systems at ELTE:

Stipendium Hungaricum MENTOR NETWORK

The Stipendium Hungaricum Mentor Network (SHMN) assists **Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holders** specifically with everyday problems, questions regarding their stay at ELTE, in Budapest, Hungary. Personal mentors are motivated and open-minded students studying at ELTE who guide Stipendium Hungaricum (SH) students through their international experience. Each mentor completes specialized training courses to effectively support SH students throughout their studies at ELTE.

The main goal of the Stipendium Hungaricum Mentor Network is peer assistance. Most of the SH mentors are scholarship holders themselves, who can provide the most help with administrative procedures.

SH students may turn to their mentors for help at any time. There are mentors working at each ELTE faculty, so SH students can turn to them with faculty-specific questions as well. The network organises several cultural and tourist events for its members, which are free of charge.

Mentors will be there for the students from the very first steps till the end of their studies and even later. During their time in Budapest, students are supported by mentors in the following activities:

The Erasmus Student Network (ESN) is one of the biggest interdisciplinary student associations in Europe. It was legally registered in 1990 to support and develop student exchanges. It is present in more than 1,000 higher education institutions in over 40 countries, and the network is constantly developing and expanding. It has around 15,000 active members in many sections supported by "mentors" or "buddies" mainly taking care of international students. Thus, ESN involves a total of around 40,000 young people offering their services to around 350,000 international students every year.

ESN ELTE is also a part of this international community. Both their programmes and the mentor system aim to facilitate the integration of incoming students, following the aims and values of ESN International

The local section, ESN ELTE, works on behalf of international students. In addition to representing the rights of scholarship students at our university, our primary goal is to support incoming students by assisting with their academic, social, and practical integration. This is mainly provided through our enthusiastic mentors and through cultural and social activities, such as trips to various places within the country, cultural events, language projects, international food festivals, sports events, and parties.



ELTE Dormitory Centre

Accommodation is essential for your studies in Hungary. The University helps you by offering two services: **you can apply to the dormitories, or you can get housing assistance** from the ELTE Housing Office and its partners. With seven dormitories in Budapest and three in Szombathely (along with other specialised facilities), ELTE has the largest dormitory capacity in Hungary.

The dormitories are popular for many reasons. They are not only affordable and comfortable - more than 80% of the places have been fully renovated in the past few years -, but the community makes both your everyday life and your studies much easier.

Applications are organised centrally by the ELTE Dormitory Centre. Announcements are available on the website. Any ELTE student, regardless of their level of studies or scholarship, can apply. The applications are for specific periods, like an academic year or the summer break.



The University's Disability Centre is responsible for providing direct and indirect services to ELTE citizens, including international students and staff members.

Student Support at the **COUNSELLING CENTRE**

During your time at the university, you may experience personal and emotional issues that have an impact on your academic work and university life.

The counselling services at ELTE offer free and confidential support to students to help them overcome difficulties.

Experienced psychologists at the Faculty of Education and Psychology are available to help students cope with their difficulties, understand themselves better, and find ways to manage their situations.

They are professionally trained and widely experienced clinical and counselling psychologists, all of whom are accustomed to helping people from many different backgrounds and cultures, and dealing with a wide range of issues.

Counsellors can help you with a wide range of difficulties:

- Family problems and parental separation

Counselling sessions are held in complete confidence, in accordance with the guidelines laid down in the Psychological Ethical Code, and Counselling Centre employees are covered by the obligation of confidentiality.

Peer Support Volunteer

The ELTE Peer Counselling Group and the International Peer-Counselling Organisation (IPCO) are voluntary organisations of students majoring in Psychology. Our individual peer conversations offer up to three one-on-one meetings. The converstations are 50 minutes long and can be held in person or online. IPCO ensures complete privacy and confidentiality in all sessions as all peer support volunteers adhere to the ethical principles and code of conduct of psychologists. ELTE Talent Support

As the leading university in Hungary, ELTE has a long tradition of paying particular attention to supporting talented students. The ELTE Talent Support Council aims to help with your university studies, research work and performance at international conferences and preparation for the National Conference of Scientific Students' Association (OTDK). Therefore, each semester ELTE offers free training programmes in English. Students can choose from Presentation Skills and Poster Making or Essay, Study and Article Writing trainings. At ELTE, almost every degree programme has a Scientific Student Conference (TDK) that provide the opportunity for students to learn about the methodology of scientific research in practice. One of the best measures of the high standard of student excellence is the bi-annual National Conference of Scientific Students' Associations (OTDK).

The development of talented students is supported by a Fund established by the Talent Support Council, and students' research is assisted by various scholarships, travel grants, targeted TDK and OTDK training programmes.

For international students, **Travel Grants** are available, which support active participation in national and international academic competitions, conferences, and workshops based on online or in person attendance, or short research trips (covering travel costs, accommodation, and registration fees). These grants are recommended for students who can already present research or competition results.

Volunteering for Sustainability and Environmental Protection

ELTE Together for Environmental Consciousness (ELTE Együtt a Környezettudatos Szemlétért, abbreviated as ELTE EKSZ) is a volunteer-based institutional sustainability programme that has been operating since 2008. It has been developed and run by students, employees, and volunteers. The organisers welcome university students and university employees. The mandatory 50 hours of School Community Service can also be accounted for by the environmental protection activities carried out here.

The basic activities of the movement are the following:

- organising and conducting selective waste collection
- developing attitude-forming campaigns
- Animal-Friendly University programme
- gardening
- running a DIY and craft workshop that uses waste as raw material
- The completion of the Environmentally Conscious University programme (including offices, departments, dormitories, etc.) examines the degree of environmental awareness.
- The sustainability programme has achieved significant results through the volunteer system: it operates 1,500 collectors, 100,000 litres of selective waste are collected per week, and approximately 35,000 litres of composting capacity are available, but the most significant result is that university citizens can join long-term volunteer projects, which means 50-200 volunteers per year.

The Choir was founded in 1948, the String Orchestra in 1957. The repertoire of the Ensemble comprises works by Baroque, Classical, and Romantic masters, as well as contemporary composers. The Orchestra regularly plays symphonies and concertos, while the choir performs a cappella pieces. However, the choir and the orchestra often perform oratorios together. They also have experience in crossing the borders between classical and popular music.

The Folk Dance Ensemble was established in 1957. It now boasts a repertoire including a wide range of folk dances of the ethnic groups living in the Carpathian Basin. The Ensemble is a prestigious amateur folk dance movement and was awarded Gold Grade at the last nationwide qualification. There are two groups, the beginner-intermediate group and the advanced group.

ELTE Botanical Garden

Nature Reserve and Open-Air Geological Museum of Tata

This special geological nature reserve was established on a 3.5-acre plot on Kálvária Hill in Tata in 1953. It has also functioned as an open-air geological museum since 1991.

The nature reserve displays the geological epochs, the flora and fauna of millions of years, as well as curiosities from botanical, cultural, and mining history.

The University was appointed as the trustee of this unique nature reserve in 1994, and with the financial help of the Environmental Fund it was transformed between 1995 and 1997.

Gothard Astrophysical Observatory

The University Observatory – founded in 1881 – is a modern research and educational base. The exhibition inside demonstrates the achievements of a new, blooming science in the 19th century through the original instruments and works of the founder, Jenő Gothard. With the inspiring help of the "genius loci" – the spirit of the place – internationally recognised research is performed here. The research includes the observation of light changes of magnetic stars, young emissive objects (T Tauri stars), and the perceptibly rapid changes in the atmosphere of high-mass hot stars.

Hungarian cuisine

Hungarian food is often considered rather spicy in Europe.

The most popular spices are paprika, black pepper, and onions. Potatoes are used in many dishes. Hungarians are also famous for using sour cream and other dairy products in their soups, desserts, stuffed pancakes, and vegetable dishes. White bread is popular accompaniment to Hungarian dishes.

A few dishes to taste in the country:

- Fish Soup made of freshwater fish and paprika, served best in the city of Szeged
- "Gulyás" Soup a soup of meat and vegetables, seasoned with paprika and other spices.
- "Pörkölt" a delicious, juicy meat stew, prepared from beef or pork, chopped onion, paprika and other spices. You can eat it with either boiled potatoes or noodles
- Stuffed cabbage cabbage leaves stuffed with rice and minced pork with spicy tomato
- Somlói dumpling whipped cream and chocolate with a creamy consistency
- Lángos deep fried flatbread, usually served with garlic, sour cream and cheese
- "Kürtőskalács" Chimney cake a strip of sweet dough wrapped around a baking spit, rolled in sugar.

Climate and weather

Hungary has a typical continental climate with hot, dry summers and mildly cold snowy winters. There are four seasons in Hungary: winter (December, January, February), spring (March, April, May), summer (June, July, August), and autumn (September, October, November).

The average annual temperature is 9.7 °C. The average temperature in the summer is 23 to 28 °C, but temperatures can reach 38 °C on the hottest days in July and August. The average temperature in the winter is -7 to -3 °C and it can drop below -10 °C on the coldest days. Generally, the weather is warmest from May to September.

Geography

Hungary is a landlock country situated in the Carpathian Basin. Its two longest rivers are the Danube and the Tisza, which divide Hungary into three parts, so it is worth visiting the banks of these too. Hungary's highest point is Mount Kékes (1,015 metres) located in the Mátra mountain range. Two-thirds of Hungary's geographic area are less than 200 metres above sea level. The lowest point, near Szeged, is 77 metres above sea level.

Lake Balaton is the largest lake in Central Europe, 78 km long and between 3 and 14 km wide. Sometimes referred to as the 'Hungarian Sea', it is one of the biggest tourist attractions in the country; many Hungarians spend the summer holiday in one of the towns or villages by the lake.

Beware! Vampires ahead!

Although Vlad the Impaler (1431 -1476), more commonly known as Dracula, was born in the Kingdom of Hungary, he was in fact of Romanian origin. He was also imprisoned in the castles of Visegrád and Buda. Not actually for sucking blood, but for high treason. Interestingly, Hungarian actor Béla Lugosi became the most famous Dracula on the silver screen in the first half of the 20th century: his character was famous for his thick Hungarian accent and his line "I will suck your blood!"



Hungarian language

The official language of Hungary is Hungarian and it is one of the official languages of the European Union. Hungarians call their language "Magyar". It is a member of the Finno-Ugric language family and is not related to any of the languages in neighbouring countries. Hungarians tend to attach great importance to the uniqueness of their language; they are even proud of it. Hungarian can be considered an exception among European languages, primarily due to the fact that it does not belong to the Indo-European language family which includes most other European languages. Oh, and as for its type: Hungarian is an agglutinative language, meaning that endings are attached to words in a prescribed order – in layman's terms, we love long word monsters. Otherwise, Hungarian is rather politically correct. In fact, it does not know grammatical gender – there's no difference between his ball and her ball. It is a less known fact that Hungarian also loaned some words to the English language: coach (kocsi), hussar (huszár), itsy-bitsy (ici-pici) and sabre (szablya).



Some inventions

If you ask a Hungarian to mention some Hungarian inventions, they will come up with a list that includes basically everything that is of any importance in the world, including computers and helicopters. Well, there is always some truth in these claims, but they tend to exaggerate. Here are some actual Hungarian inventions and discoveries though: the ballpoint pen (László Bíró), Rubik's Cube (Ernő Rubik), holography (Dénes Gábor), the safety match (János Irinyi), the concept of nuclear chain reaction (Leó Szilárd), the theory of the hydrogen bomb (Ede Teller), the electric motor (Ányos Jedlik), the cure for puerperal fever (Ignác Semmelweis), vitamin C, discovering the components and reactions of the citric acid cycle (Albert Szent-Györgyi), mRNA technology in immunology and therapies (Katalin Karikó).



Hungary, ELTE, and the Olympic Games

Strangely enough for such a small country, Hungarians are ranked number ten in the All-Time Olympic Games medal table. We are very proud that six ELTE students participated in the 2016 Rio Olympic Games. One of them, the swimmer Boglárka Kapás, won a bronze medal in the Women's 800m Freestyle. Áron Szilágyi became the fifth fencer in the history of the modern Olympic Games since 1896 to win back-to-back individual gold medals, last time in 2020 in Tokio. Csaba Burján, a student of the ELTE Faculty of Science, also became an Olympic champion when he won a gold medal for Speed Skating in t. he 2018 Winter Olympics. Fanni Illés in 2020 become champion in swimming at the Paralympic Games Tokio. At the 2024 Summer Olympics the men's foil duelists beat the defending champions Japan in a fierce battle, giving Hungary its first men's foil team gold after a 52-year break. The team included Gergely Siklósi, an alumnus of the Faculty of Education and Psychology.





Hungarian names

In Hungary, as in China, Japan, and Korea, the so-called Eastern name order (family name followed by given name) is used. Interestingly, while Japanese and Hungarian names are usually reversed when individuals with such names are mentioned in Western countries (e.g. Puskás Ferenc becomes Ferenc Puskás), Chinese and Korean names, as well as the names of historical Japanese figures are usually left in the Eastern order (e.g. Mao Zedong).

Hungarians also celebrate name days. Each given name is assigned to one or more days in the calendar.

People usually give some minor gifts, like flowers or sweets, to each other on this occasion.



Should you have not recognised the "lyrics" quoted above, we'll help you: it is the fanfare of the major American film studio 20th Century Fox. It was founded by William Fox (born as Vilmos Fried in Tolcsva, Hungary), a Hungarian Jew. Adolph Zukor, founder of Paramount Pictures, and Michael Curtiz, Hungarian film director, are two more founders of Hollywood filmmaking. Other Hungarian-born figures that were present at the birth of Hollywood are actor Béla Lugosi and director George Cukor.

Recently, it seems Hungarian films have done well in the film award seasons. In 2016, László Nemes Jeles with his debut feature film, "Son of Saul" ("Saul fia" in Hungarian) won the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film. The next year, Kristóf Deák's film "Sing" ("Mindenki" in Hungarian) won the 2017 Academy Award for "Best Live Action Short Film". "On Body and Soul" ("Testről és lélekről" in Hungarian), written and directed by Ildikó Enyedi, won the Golden Bear in the 67th Berlin International Film Festival. At the 96th Academy Awards in 2024 Zsuzsa Mihalek, the set designer of "Poor Things", alongside her British production designer-coworkers, was honored with the Academy Award for Best Production Design.



The Renaissance of Hungarian Wine-making

If you are from a country that has no wine-making traditions, you'll surely be surprised to find that you can purchase good quality bottled wines here for as little as 1,500 HUF. Hungary's internationally best-known wine is probably the white dessert wine Tokaji, but there are many more wine regions in the country, such as Badacsony, Eger, Szekszárd, and Villány. "Fröccs" (spritzer), a mixture of wine and soda water, has recently become popular again. It is a true Hungarian speciality. Depending on the ratio of wine to soda water, there are various types of "fröccs" drinks. The name of the "fröccs" reflects the proportion of wine.

Here are some examples:

- "Kisfröccs": 1 dl wine + 1 dl soda water
- "Nagyfröccs": 2 dl wine + 1 dl soda water
- "Hosszúlépés": 1 dl wine + 2 dl soda water
- "Házmester": 3 dl wine + 2 dl soda water
- "Viceházmester": 2 dl wine + 3 dl soda water

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Living in Budapest

Famous sights

IN BUDAPEST



Buda Castle Hill

The Castle Hill, which houses the Royal Palace, the Fisherman's Bastion, and Matthias Church, is easily visible from everywhere in Budapest. Exploring the beautiful buildings and cobblestone streets in the Castle District can take an entire day, but it is time well spent. The Royal Palace, rebuilt in Neoclassical style in the place of the once-famous medieval palace, is home to the Hungarian National Gallery, the Budapest History Museum, and the National Széchényi Library. The Fisherman's Bastion is one of the most fascinating sights on the Castle Hill. Although fishermen from Watertown reputedly defended this part of the city during the Middle Ages, the Fisherman's Bastion was built in the 1890s for purely decorative purposes.



Chain Bridge (Lánchíd)

The Chain Bridge was the first bridge to permanently connect Buda and Pest. At the time of its completion, the Chain Bridge was one of the wonders of the world. Crossing the bridge is just a short walk, and no matter which direction you go, the view is beautiful.



Opera House (Operaház)

The Opera House is not only one of the most significant artistic monuments of Budapest, but also the symbol of the Hungarian operatic tradition. Designed by Miklós Ybl, a major figure of 19th century Hungarian architecture, the construction lived up to the highest expectations. Ornamentation included paintings and sculptures by the leading figures of contemporary Hungarian art: Károly Lotz, Bertalan Székely, Mór Than, and Alajos Stróbl. Many renowned artists were guests here, including Gustav Mahler, the composer who directed the institution from 1887 to 1891 and who established the international prestige of the institution.



Heroes' Square (Hősök tere) and City Park (Városliget)

Heroes' Square is the largest and most impressive square in the city. The Millennium Monument standing in the middle of the square was erected in 1896 to commemorate the 1000th anniversary of the Hungarians' arrival in the Carpathian Basin. The Museum of Fine Arts (Szépművészeti Múzeum) is located on the northern side of the square. The Hall of Art, an exhibition hall for contemporary art, is on the southern side. The City Park, which is just behind the square, provides a refreshing escape from the bustle of the city. The 1896 Millennium Celebrations took place here, leaving many attractions behind. Vajdahunyad Castle was built to exemplify various architectural styles of Hungary, and has Romanesque, Gothic, Renaissance, and Baroque elements. There is a boating lake next to the castle, which is turned into an ice-skating rink in winter.





Margaret Island (Margit-sziget)

Margaret Island now serves as a recreational park in the middle of the Danube. It is a great place to take a walk, swim a few laps or go for a run. During the summer months, bicycles are also available for hire. Since vehicles are prohibited, the island is a fantastic place to escape from the city's traffic.



Central Market Hall (Központi Vásárcsarnok)

The spectacular Central Market Hall is a good place to buy Hungarian products. You can also stop by for a quick bite of traditional Hungarian food when touring the city. Shop with the locals for meat, cheese, fruits, vegetables, and pastries.



Andrássy Avenue (Andrássy út)

This elegant avenue, recognised as a World Heritage Site, is often referred to as the Champs-Elysées of Budapest. It is also called a cultural avenue, as the Opera House, the Liszt Ferenc Academy of Music, and several museums and, theatres are located on the avenue or nearby.



Váci Street and Vörösmarty Square (Váci utca and Vörösmarty tér)

Váci Street is perhaps the most famous street in Budapest. It runs from Vörösmarty Square to the Central Market Hall and features a large number of restaurants, shops, and cafés. Vörösmarty Square, located at the heart of Budapest, is always busy. This is where the famous Gerbeaud Café, as well as one of the terminuses of the Millennium Underground, can be found.



The Hungarian National Assembly (the House of Parliament) (Országház or Parlament)

The Parliament building, a magnificent example of Neo-Gothic architecture, is just over 100 years old. It is the third largest Parliament building in the world and also home to the Hungarian Crown Jewels. Guided tours start from the Visitor Centre, located next to the northern façade of the building, which is open daily from 8 a.m. to 4 or 6 p.m., depending on the season. Visits to the House of Parliament are restricted when the National Assembly holds its plenary sessions.

Green areas IN BUDAPEST

With the City Park and the Margaret Island mentioned in the former section, we have already given you some examples of nice parks in Budapest – these are the two most popular, and the biggest. As visiting these beautiful, comforting places is a good way of raising one's spirits, and the parks can be important places for our students to "recharge" in the busier periods of university life, we would like to give you some more examples:



Népsziget (People's Island)

Budapest's most northerly park is the perfect place to cycle, run, picnic or just take a long walk in complete tranquility.



Rómaipart (Roman Shore)

Located in the northern part of Buda, this is one of the most popular waterfront recreation spots



Városmajor

Just a few minutes from the centre of Buda; here you can relax, do sports, or join one of the colourful programmes on offer.



Orczy Park

Located between Klinikák and Nagyvárad Square, this is the perfect place for everyone: there's a running track, a lake, playground, and some space to picnic in the shade of the trees.



Kopaszi Dam

Home to vast green spaces, restaurants and cafés, it is located in the Lágymányos Bay in South Buda.



Olympic Park

Between Kossuth Square and Jászai Mari Square, there is a real community space where you can picnic, relax, play sports and games.



Feneketlen-tó (Bottomless Lake)

One of Újbuda's most popular recreational areas, which lies between Kosztolányi Dezső square and Móricz Zsigmond square.



Millenáris Park

A park next to the Mammut shopping centres with a thousand faces, which can be thought of as an outdoor cultural centre or community space.



Bikás Park (Bulls' Park)

One of the greenest corners of Újbuda, named after its bull sculptures.

Arrival in BUDAPEST

AIRPORT

Budapest Airport, officially called Budapest Liszt Ferenc International Airport (former name: Ferihegy) is the main international airport in the country. It is situated approximately 20 km south-east off the city centre. Website: bud.hu

How to reach the city centre from Budapest International Airport?

Bus 100E takes passengers from the Airport to Deák tér and back. The bus service operates around the clock, seven days a week:

every 6-10 minutes on Mondays and Fridays, during the day

every 7-10 minutes on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays, during the day every 10-15 in the mornings and evenings

every 30-40 minutes on average at night

Passengers may get off the bus on the way to Deák tér at Kálvin tér and Astoria stations.

PLEASE NOTE! A special ticket called Airport Shuttle Bus Single Ticket must be purchased for bus 100E for HUF 2,200 – other tickets or season tickets are not valid for this service. You can buy this ticket on the Budapest Pay&GO device with bankcard on board or via the BudapestGO app, which can be used for buying further tickets and for journey planning.

Bus 200E takes passengers to Kőbánya-Kispest underground/metro station (line M3) from the Airport and back. From the Kőbánya-Kispest metro station, passengers can take the M3 metro towards Újpest Központ to reach the city centre. It is possible to change for metro lines M1 and M2 at Deák Ferenc tér station in the city centre.

Tickets for public transportation (such as bus 200E) priced 500 HUF are available at the Airport from BKK at the customer service points, the post office, the newsagents (Relay), and the ticket machines at the bus stop. It is also possible to purchase a ticket from the bus driver for 600 HUF. The post office is located on the mezzanine level in Terminal 2A, where 24-hour, 72-hour, weekly, and monthly travel passes for Budapest public transport are also available. Newsagents only sell single tickets, 10-piece ticket booklets, and short section tickets.

BudapestGO APPLICATION

(You can download the app from Google Play or from the App Store)

Use the application to plan your journey in Budapest using BKK public transport services.

All operating buses, trams, and trolleybuses are displayed on the map.

On the nearby departures screen, the app collects departing routes from stops in the area, which will start in the near future.

By clicking on a stop on the map, real-time upcoming departure times and the full timetable for that stop are shown.

You can mark a place or a stop as a favourite in order to access it more quickly.

RAILWAYS

Hungarian State Railways (Magyar Államvasutak or MÁV) is the national railway company in Hungary.

There are three international railway stations in Budapest:

- Eastern Railway Station or Keleti pályaudvar (1087 Budapest, Kerepesi út 2-4)
- Western Railway Station or Nyugati pályaudvar (1062 Budapest, Teréz körút 55)
- Southern Railway Station or Déli pályaudvar (1013 Budapest, Krisztina krt. 37/A)

Each railway station is part of the Budapest underground railway network ("metró" in Hungarian). The Southern and Eastern Railway Stations are situated at metro stations along line M2 (Red Line)



More than fifty trains provide direct links between Budapest and twenty-five other European capitals. Direct trains to Vienna run every one or two hours, departing from Budapest between 5.40 a.m. and 8.40 p.m.

INTERNATIONAL AND DOMESTIC COACH SERVICE

VOLÁNBUSZ operates most of the international and domestic coaches from Budapest, and also the regional lines and those crossing the agglomeration. During the day, there are coaches every hour or more often in the direction of Eger, Salgótarján, Gyöngyös, Jászberény, Kecskemét, Székesfehérvár, Veszprém and Tatabánya, and there are many lines to the Mátra Mountains, the Great Plain, Lake Balaton, and other destinations.

The main International Coach Station is situated at Népliget, on metro line M3 (1091 Budapest, Üllői út 131). To find specific connections, please check the websites of the main international coach companies (e.g. EUROLINES, Flixbus, or Student Agency).

PASSENGER VESSELS ON THE DANUBE

Hydrofoil services operate during the summer months (from April to October) linking the heart of Budapest with Vienna and Bratislava. International moorings on the Danube in Budapest are located between Lánchíd (Chain Bridge) and Szabadság híd (Liberty Bridge).

DRIVING

All motorways and most of the main roads radiate from Budapest. Most motorways are toll roads, so you have to buy e-vignettes that are available at the border, at larger petrol stations, or **online**. Road signs conform to continental standards. It is mandatory to wear seatbelts in both the front and back seats, and drivers may not use mobile phones while the vehicles are in motion. The alcohol limit is zero. Speed limits are 50 km/hour (31 mph) in built-up areas and 90 km/hour (56 mph) elsewhere, except on dual carriageways (110 km/ hour, 68 mph) and motorways (130 km/hour, 80 mph).

Getting around IN BUDAPEST

Budapest has an efficient, diverse, and low-cost transportation network, including buses, underground railways, trolleybuses, trams, suburban railways (HÉV), and boat services. The Centre for Budapest Transport (Budapesti Közlekedési Központ, BKK) is responsible for the main transport services in Budapest (including the bus, tram, metro, suburban railway and trolleybus networks) in an integrated system. BKK Customer Service Offices can be found in and around Budapest Airport, major train and subway stations and the city centre.

Transportation tickets and passes

If you want to use public transportation, keep in mind that you must have a valid ticket or pass. Tickets are available all around the city at metro stations, tram stations or street kiosks. Once you have a ticket or pass, you can use it on the whole network, regardless of the service. Exceptions are: Danube public boat services at weekends, the Buda chairlift, and the Castle Hill Funicular services. Note that Budapest Passes (such as the BKK Monthly Student Pass) are only valid within the administrative borders of Budapest; you might need to purchase additional tickets if you intend to travel to neighbouring municipalities using the bus or suburban railway services. As for single tickets, you need to validate a new ticket for each journey. If you are in hurry, single tickets are available from the bus/tram driver at a higher price.

You can also download the "Közlekedési Mobiljegy" app with which you can easily purchase your monthly pass (with a credit card). The app has an English menu and you can open the pass on your phone when needed.

Ticket types and prices (August 2025):

- Single ticket: 500 HUF (600 HUF if purchased from the driver)
- Monthly Budapest passes for students: 945 HUF (with valid Hungarian student ID), 3,450 HUF (with a valid EU student ID)

Note! Passengers travelling without a valid ticket or pass can be fined. Ticket inspectors are liable to appear on board at any time. The fine is HUF 12,000 on the spot; 25,000 HUF if paid afterwards using a postal cheque. You can only access the subway network upon presenting your ticket or pass.

Buses

Budapest has more than 200 bus routes covering most of the inner city and suburban areas. Some routes offer an express service, indicated with an "E" following the bus number. On the main routes, services are available even at night.





Subways

The Budapest subway network has four lines:

M1 or the Yellow Line: between Vörösmarty tér and Mexikói út M2 or the Red Line: between Déli pályaudvar and Örs vezér tere M3 or the Blue Line: between Újpest Központ and Kőbánya-Kispest M4 or the Green Line: between Kelenföld vasútállomás and Keleti pályaudvar

The Yellow Line is the oldest subway line in Hungary and also in mainland Europe. It was opened in 1896 for the Millennium celebrations. The newest line is the Green Line which was opened in 2014. All Subways run from 4.30 a.m. until 11.30 p.m - the M2, M3 and M4 lines are operating longer, especially during the weekends. However, the exact hours are not finalized. Please, check the timetable when planning your journey.

Suburban railway (HÉV)

The suburban train service of Budapest (HÉV) connects Budapest with the suburban areas. A popular journey for tourists is from Batthyány tér to Szentendre. Keep in mind that if you leave the area of Budapest, you need to purchase an additional ticket to your destination in the suburbs. These suburban single tickets cannot be purchased in the BudapestGO application – but in the MÁV application Website: mavcsoport.hu

There are some suburban areas, or other areas outside of Budapest, which you can reach by bus - in this case you should buy the ticket on the bus, or from a machine at the stop.

To avoid any issues when leaving Budapest, you can also purchase a monthly **Pest County Pass**, valid in Budapest and surrounding Pest County.

If you plan to travel outside the county, you can also buy a **Hungary Pass**, which is valid for almost all BKK services, suburban and regional buses, HÉV suburban railways and selected trains throughout the country. These special passes are available both in the BudapestGO and the MÁV applications. Pest County Pass with student discount is available with a valid Hungarian student ID. Hungary Pass with student discount is available with a valid Hungarian student ID

Taxi

You can always hail a cab in the street, but it is cheaper to book one on the phone, online or with apps. You should avoid hailing unmarked taxis. Even if they have a taxi sign on the roof and are seen standing at taxi ranks, do not get in the car unless they have a company name on the outside of the car. Since September 2013, every taxi has been uniformly yellow in Budapest.

Car-sharing services in Budapest

Car-sharing services are also available in Budapest. They provide a new, convenient, fast, and environment-friendly means of transport. Electric cars are available at many points of the city, you just need to download an app and register for the service.

Biking in Budapest - The MOL Bicycle-Sharing Network, BUBI

MOL Bubi is a bicycle-sharing network in Budapest. The apple-green bikes can be hired from and returned to any docking station found at major transport hubs in the city centre. Currently 2,460 bikes can be hired from 222 docking stations in the centre of Budapest.

Night buses

The night transport service in Budapest is one of the best in Europe. You will find that you can get anywhere in the city using night buses. Night buses usually start at midnight and run until 4 a.m. every night. The numbering of night buses starts with No. 9.

Note that some night buses on very busy lines run quite often (every 10 or 15 minutes), but lines running to the suburbs run only once or twice an hour.

SAFETY

Hungary is generally a safe country, and people in Hungary are hospitable. Violent crime is relatively rare in Budapest, but pickpockets may be active on public transport vehicles, in crowded shops, food markets, and popular tourist venues.

A few tips:

- Wallets should not be kept in the back pockets of your trousers or in the outside pockets of your bag.
- · Keep your money, documents, mobile phone safe and secure in an inside pocket.
- Passports and travel documents should be kept in a safe place.
- Do not show your cash, particularly large banknotes, unnecessarily in public places.
- In general, do not do anything that you would not do in your own country.

Pharmacies are usually open until 8 p.m., but some are open around the clock with dispensing chemists on night duty. Note if you go to a pharmacy in the evening or during the night, you have to go to a special window and sometimes ring a bell too.

General cost of LIVING

Hungary is considered an affordable country compared to Western Europe. Still, please be careful about your expenditure, because living in Budapest is getting more and more expensive. Especially on the main tourist sites, the city offers a huge variety of bars, restaurants, and shops with high prices. You just need to take a short walk from the centre, and you will find places with more reasonable prices. Considering the different expenditures, you can calculate with the following rate: 1 EUR = approx. 398 HUF (July, 2025).

Paying taxes in HUNGARY

If you study at ELTE with a Hungarian governmental scholarship (e.g. Stipendium Hungaricum), you are required to apply for a Tax Card after your arrival in Hungary. You need to request a Tax Card in person at the National Tax and Customs Administration (Nemzeti Adó- és Vámhivatal). First application for a Tax Card is free of charge. You will need to take your passport with you.

You need to pay taxes if you have a job in Hungary or you receive any other income from any source in Hungary.

Banking in HUNGARY

If you study at ELTE with a Hungarian governmental scholarship (e.g. Stipendium Hungaricum), you are required to open a Hungarian bank account where your scholarship will be transferred

You are free to choose any bank that will accept your application. That is a private business decision for the bank. Before opening a bank account, the bank needs to get to know its potential clients. This may require more care in assessing bank account requests from non-residents. Some banks may, therefore, have a policy not to accept non-resident customers.

To open a bank account, you must present your passport and another identification document (such as a driver's license, tax card, etc.). If you are a non-EEA student, it is usually necessary to have a valid residence permit and address card to open a bank account, although some banks

allow foreigners to open an account on presentation of a passport. In Hungary, banks are typically open on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Banks are not open on Saturdays, except for some branches in shopping centres.

If you need help to open a bank account, you can ask your mentor to assist you.

Automatic teller machines (ATMs)

ATMs can be found all over Hungary and Budapest. Hungarian banks charge a commission on the use of ATMs. Note that higher fees might apply for using an ATM that is not operated by the bank that issued your bank card.

You do not need to worry about exchanging Hungarian Forints before your arrival and carrying cash. ATM machines are widely available in major cities, and they accept Visa and Mastercard debit cards.

Postal and telephone SERVICES

Magyar Posta (the Hungarian Post Office) is the postal administration of Hungary. Besides normal mail delivery, Magyar Posta also offers logistics, banking, and marketing services.

Typically, you can post a letter at a post office, or you can just drop it, properly stamped, into a post-box in the street. You can easily find post offices in Budapest and the main branches are usually open until 8 p.m. As with post offices, always check when the postbox is emptied.

The country code for Hungary is 36. Calls to international destinations are in the format 00 + country code + number. On mobile phones, + can be used instead of 00.

Mobile phone use is very widespread in Hungary. There are three main service providers in the country: Telekom, Yettel, and Vodafone. There is no major difference in the mobile phone tariffs, but fees per minute within the same network are typically cheaper, so you might want to join the same provider as your friends use. You can choose either a pre-paid or a monthly payment system for phone usage.

At the beginning of each semester, ESN ELTE and the SH mentoring network helps new international students to obtain a Hungarian SIM card shortly after their arrival.

Shopping

There are plenty of opportunities for shopping in Budapest. Most stores are open from Monday till Saturday between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. and, on Sunday between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Shopping centres have longer opening hours from Monday till Sunday, between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. On public holidays, all shops are closed. You can find the following supermarket chains in Hungary: Spar, Tesco, Lidl, Aldi, CBA, Coop.

Food markets (like the Central Market Hall) are the best places if you want to buy fresh fruit or vegetables at a reasonable price. They are open from Monday till Saturday between 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Many locals do their shopping there.

One of the main and most famous shopping areas in Budapest is Váci street. It is a shopping promenade, which runs from Vámház körút (Central Market Hall) to Vörösmarty square, with a large number of fashionable shops, restaurants, and cafés. Andrássy Avenue can offer another great shopping experience if you have a higher budget. It is a place where famous designer shops (like Gucci, Armani, Louis Vuitton, Dolce & Gabbana) can be found.

If you want to purchase unique gifts, there are numerous art shops in the city centre. Budapest has an expanding design community. Király utca, also known as the Design Street in Budapest, is filled with interior design and furniture stores, funky boutiques, and modern art galleries.



Cultural programmes in BUDAPEST

Budapest has a rich and varied cultural life. We have collected the most important current places of Hungarian culture for you.

Cinema

Hungarians like the cinema. Budapest is full of opportunities to watch a good movie. You just need to choose whether it will be a classic Hollywood or art movie, in a 3D or art cinema, dubbed or subtitled. Ticket prices range from 2,500 to 3,500 HUF. If you present your student card, you are eligible for a discount ticket price.

If you want to watch the most popular Hollywood movies, you should go to one of the cinemas belonging to the "Cinema City" (cinemacity.hu) chain. There is a Cinema City in almost every major shopping centre.

Art cinemas not only offer movies but also act as a meeting point where you can drink a coffee or beer with your friends.



The Hungarian National Museum collects archaeological, historical, ethnic objects on the history of Hungary and the Carpathian Basin. It is one of the oldest and largest museums in Hungary. **Website: mnm.hu**

The Museum of Fine Arts was founded in 1896 and opened in 1906. The museum's collection consists mostly of international works of art, including over 120,000 items from all periods of European art. Website: szepmuyeszeti.hu

The Hungarian National Gallery was established in 1957 as the national art museum. It is located in the Buda Castle in Budapest. It has the largest public collection documenting and presenting the rise and development of fine arts in Hungary.

Ludwig Museum - Museum of Contemporary Art collects and displays masterworks of modern and contemporary art. The permanent collection contains valuable pieces of American pop art (Andy Warhol, Claes Oldenburg, Robert Rauschenberg etc.).
