



Our distinguished keynote speakers

Sue Harper is Emeritus Professor of Film History at the University of Portsmouth. She is a cultural historian who has written widely on British cinema, and made numerous appearances on radio and television. She was the Principal Investigator on the 1970s AHRC-funded project, '1970s British Cinema, Film and Video: Mainstream and Counter-Culture' (2006-2009). She received the Outstanding Achievement Award from the British Association of Film, Theatre and Television in 2017. Over the last 3 years, Prof. Harper has branched into fiction and published *The Dark Nest* with Egaeus Press in 2020. Her short stories are on her website (https://www.sueharper.co.uk/). Her books include: *British Film Culture in the 1970s, The Boundaries of Pleasure, Women in British Cinema: Mad, Bad and Dangerous to Know (Rethinking British Cinema S.), Picturing the Past: Rise and Fall of the British Costume Film, The Dark Nest.*

Roel Vande Winkel is Associate Professor in Film & TV Studies at KU Leuven and at LUCA School of Arts, Belgium. He is associate editor of the "Historical Journal of Film, Radio and Television". He published several monographs and edited collections, including "Cinema and the Swastika: The International Expansion of Third Reich Cinema" (2011 revised, with David Welch) and "Film Professionals in Nazi-Occupied Europe" (2021, with Pavel Skopal). In 2020, he published a website that provides an overview of film programming and the organisation of the cinema sector during the Second World War in Belgium (https://www.cinema-in-occupied-belgium.be) He is currently writing a monograph on that subject.

Teréz Vincze is Senior Lecturer at the Department of Film Studies of ELTE, editor of Metropolis (Quarterly Journal on Film History and Film Theory – www.metropolis.org.hu) since 1999, and editorin-chief between 2003 and 2009. Her publications include: *Szerző a tükörben – Szerzőiség és önreflexió a filmművészetben.* [Author in the Mirror: Auteurism and Self-Reflexivity in Cinema.] (Metropolis Books) Kijárat Kiadó, Budapest, 2013.
