

I. ELTE Workshop on Arts Education (EWAE)

The New Image of the World in Arts and Science **ELTE University, Budapest, 23-24 June 2017**

First Call for Papers

Educators active in various art forms and genres have their own international events that are rarely visited by those who create and teach in other forms of art. This workshop offers a venue for creative encounters where **educators of dance, drama, music and visual arts,** as well as researchers of **child and youth culture** may meet, recognize common concerns and share research and good practice and develop cross-disciplinary creative or research projects.

Conference format

Five faculties of <u>Eötvös Loránd University</u> (<u>ELTE</u>), Hungary's oldest and highly respected research university (in the top 5% worldwide), launches a series of yearly arts education workshops and invites practitioners of all the art forms, active or interested in education, to meet in <u>discipline based sessions</u> and <u>interdisciplinary workshops</u>, and <u>exhibitions</u> of <u>extended poster sessions</u>.

Each year, education through one of the art forms takes the lead, but all others are given equal attention. In 2017, the Visual Culture Research Group of the Hungarian Academy of Science and ELTE organises the event that focuses on **interrelationships of arts and science.** George Kepes, painter, photographer, designer, educator, and art theorist, tutor of the German Bauhaus and the American New Bauhaus, founder of the <u>Center for Advanced Visual Studies</u> at the <u>Massachusetts Institute of Technology</u> (MIT), published a landmark book entitled "New Landscapes in Science and Art that presents in pictures the new visual world revealed by science and technology. His work is an inspiration for all the art forms.

Submission formats and deadline

- **Papers** (25 minutes followed by 10 minutes of discussion)
- Workshops of 90 minutes on the practice of in dance, drama, music and visual arts (including media) education
- Extended poster sessions where projects may be presented in 1-3 A0 size posters or equally sized collections of works of art.

Short or extended abstracts of 2500-10000 characters should be submitted for each formats through the online conference registration system. The conference is a peer-reviewed scientific event. All submissions will be reviewed by two or three reviewers.

Proceedings

A printed version of abstracts and a DVD of extended presentations (with illustrations) will be available at registration. The conference book with ISBN number will be offered for indexing in major scientific reference systems.
